I give thanks for life and put my trust in all its possibilities for good ... For my good, for the good of those whose lives mine touches, for all people, and for the earth itself;


I celebrate the honest search for meaning, for purpose, for peace, for truth and wholeness shown by people of faith through the ages, and join them in the quest;

have felt our imagination quickened, our creativity fired, the boundaries of our understanding and empathy extended;




